UNDERSTANDABLE



IS THE INFORMATION UNDERSTANDABLE FOR YOUR PARTICIPANTS SO THAT THEY CAN PARTICIPATE MEANINGFULLY?

GOOD EXAMPLES

A social-sportive initiative offers participants detailed information about activities, including the rules of the game, supervision, costs, and more, based on their level of understanding

A social-sportive initiator uses a free app to communicate with participants instead of relying on paid text messages. This approach increases the chances of participants or their parents responding, fostering a two-way dialogue between the initiator and the participants.

An initiator mediates between young people, their parents, and the school. This initiator helps to bridge cultural differences and can interpret or translate when necessary.

A initiator guides non-native newcomers in the city and introduces them to useful services and social assistance.

EXAMPLES OF BARRIERS

Clear information is crucial during a crisis, such as the rules implemented during the COVID-19 pandemic. If certain groups don't understand the information, they may be unable to follow the rules, increasing their risk of illness or fines from external authorities.
